Justin Ritzinger (PhD, Harvard) is an associate professor of religious studies at the University of Miami, whose research focuses on modern Buddhism in China and Taiwan. He is author of *Anarchy in the Pure Land: Reinventing the Cult of Maitreya in Modern Chinese Buddhism* (Oxford University Press, 2017), and is currently working on ethnographic study of a small blue-collar lay group in Taoyuan, Taiwan.

Erik Schicketanz (PhD, Tokyo) is assistant professor at Kokugakuin University. His current research project investigates the role of religion in Sino-Japanese relations during the 1930s and 1940s, focusing on the North China region. He is author of *Between Decline and Revival: Historical Discourse and Modern Chinese Buddhism's Encounter with Japan* (2016), published in Japanese by Hōzōkan.
