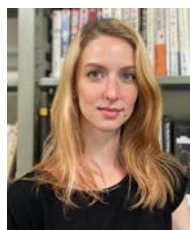

Her research focuses on the early modern global encounters and the activity of the Jesuits in Japan. She is currently working on a book project on the impact of the missionary activity in Japan in the process of reframing 'Religion' in Europe.

Rômulo da Silva Ehalt (PhD, Tokyo University of Foreign Studies) is a researcher at the Max Planck Institute for Legal History and Legal Theory (Germany). His research focuses on early modern slavery and religious normativities in Portuguese Asia and the Spanish Philippines. He is currently working on a book manuscript on the Society of Jesus and slavery in early modern Japan.



Alexandra Curvelo (PhD, Nova University of Lisbon) is Associate Professor at the Department of Art History, Universidade Nova de Lisboa. She is Deputy-Director of the Art History Institute (IHA) and Associate Researcher of the Portuguese Center for Global History (CHAM) at NOVA FCSH. In January 2018 was appointed Adviser of Nanban Culture by the Mayor of Amakusa Island, Japan.
