from the vice president of TEPCO

March II, 2011. The world witnested The Great East Japan Earthquake. I was in the second grade of elementary school at that time. Do you remember what happened on that day?

Following the big earthquake and tsunami,
TEPCO's nuclear powerplants melted down.
After the accident, everyone was in confusion.
People lived in anxiety and chaos, wondering
if they were safe where they were, if they
could protect their loved ones.

Mr. Yoshiyuki Ishizaki was appointed as TEPCO's Vice President. Under such circumstances, he repeatedly apologized and explained the situation to residents, but because they didn't know about radiation well, and because they wanted to protect their children or their family, everyone directed harsh words at him.

Mr. Ishizaki had joined TEPCO with a passion to support modern way of life, but ended up in a position to apologize. I wonder if the responsibility of the accident really lies solely with "TEPCO people."

I asked him to come speak at Tohoku
University. Not only he kindly accepted, but
said, "If possible, I would like to speak face to
face in front of everyone."

Electricity is a blood of our lifestyle.
